# BUSINESSES FOR CLEAN WATER

## Stormwater runoff is...

- Rain and snowmelt that flow over land or impervious surfaces and do not percolate into the ground
- Runoff accumulates debris, chemicals, sediment or other pollutants as flows over land or impervious surface
- Primary method to control and treat stormwater discharges = best management practices (BMPs)



# Clean Water Act (1972)

- Regulates point sources of pollutants that discharge to Waters of the US
  - Wastewater
  - Stormwater
- Point source = discrete conveyances such as pipes or man-made ditches
- Unlawful to discharge any pollutant from a point source into navigable waters, unless a permit was obtained



## National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES)

- EPA Program
- Permit required for point sources if discharges go directly to surface waters (municipal, industrial, other)
- Individual homes connected to municipal system, using septic system, or without surface discharge do not need NPDES permit
- In Maryland, administered by State with EPA oversight



## Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) Phase 1

- Conveyance or system of conveyances that is:
  - Owned by government and that discharges to waters of the U.S.;
  - Designed to collect or convey stormwater (including storm drains, pipes, ditches, etc.);
  - Not combined sewer; and
  - Not part of sewage treatment plant.
- Phase 1 = counties or municipalities >100,000 population







## **Carroll County NPDES MS4 Permit**

- Issued December 29, 2014 (4<sup>th</sup> generation)
- Co-permittees = Carroll County & Municipalities
  - Memorandum of Agreement
- Five-year term
- Enforceable by MDE and EPA, fines for non-compliance



# **Primary Legal Requirements**

- Manage, implement, and enforce stormwater management program to:
  - Effectively prohibit pollutants in stormwater discharge
  - Attain total maximum daily loads (TMDLs) for Chesapeake Bay and local streams
  - Comply with all provisions and requirements in the permit and in plans and schedules developed

  - Litter and Floatables
  - Property Management and Maintenance

# **Standard Permit Requirements**

- Restoration Plans
  - Watershed assessments
  - Restoration plans
    - Restore 20% untreated impervious surface
    - Plans to be completed by December 29, 2015
  - Public participation
- Monitoring
- Adequate Program Funding

# **Annual Report**

- Status of permit conditions
- Monitoring data results
- Expenditures and budget
- Progress made toward attaining water quality / TMDLs / impervious restoration
- Data

To be submitted to MDE by December 29 each year
Reapplication required in December 2018

- Clean Water Act
- State Environmental Article

## Restoration Requirement vs. TMDLs

- <u>Restoration requirement</u> = 20% of untreated impervious surface
- <u>Chesapeake Bay TMDL</u> best management practices (BMPs) to be in place by 2025
- Permit says <u>20% = adequate progress</u> toward that Bay TMDL for this 5-year period

Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) = maximum amount of pollutant a water body can receive and still meet water quality standards (fishable & swimmable)



# **Capital Projects**

- Majority of permit costs
- Credit toward impervious area mitigation and nutrient reduction for certain activities
  - Stormwater facility retrofits
  - Tree planting
  - Other activities:
    - Septic pumpage
    - Easements via development process
    - Other

### **Carroll County Environmental Management of Storm Sewer Systems Code, Chapter 53**

- Required by permit
- Legal authority to prohibit illicit discharges per PART IV.B. of permit



## Inspections (Tim Hare, Chief Inspector)

- Complaint received
- Environmental Inspector visits site
- Response letter sent to property owner if determined to be a violation
